## 5.2 must/mustn't, should/shouldn't

- Must expresses obligation and necessity:
  You must be very careful with other people's things.
- Mustn't expresses prohibition:
  You mustn't cross that bridge. It isn't safe.
- To express lack of necessity or obligation, we use don't have to, not mustn't:
   You don't have to come with us. You can stay at home.
- Like all modal verbs, must and mustn't have the same form for every person:
   I/You/He/She/It/We/They must train a lot

I/You/He/She/It/We/They **must** train a lot. I/You/He/She/It/We/They **mustn't** work so hard.

We use should/shouldn't to give or ask for advice:
 You should study more.
 You shouldn't drink so much coffee.
