5.5 Past Simple: was/were, could

- We use the Past Simple to talk about events and situations that started and ended in the past: John and I were at the same school.
 We both could play basketball and football, but we couldn't play tennis.
- The Past Simple form of the verb to be is was/were:

Affirmative		Negative
I/He/She/It was	at school.	I/He/ wasn't She/It (was not) at
You/We/ They were		You/We/ weren't school. They (were not)
Yes/No questions		Short answers
Was I/he/she/it	at school?	Yes, I/he/she/it was. No, I/he/she/it wasn't.
Were you/we/		Yes, you/we/they were. No, you/we/they weren't.
